WTO as A Social Contract

Abstract

Through a brief introduction of the basic Three, Two, One of the WTO, the Three basic functions, the Two groups of countries between the developed and the developing, and the One principle of nondiscrimination, the talk elaborates the jurisprudence of the WTO as an emancipatory international social contract on trade. The talk explains how the WTO operates within the reign of state primacythe force-ultimately for the benefits of individuals-the ends-in the global marketplace, and gains a soul of its own in the institutional evolution-the means-of the global trading regime. During this evolution, WTO has successfully made governments accountable to foreign individuals in various capacities either as traders of goods, providers of services, or holders of IP rights within the global marketplace. The talk offers a unified WTO jurisprudence looking at the WTO as an international social contract on trade allowing a fresh look at the force, the means, and the ends of the constitutional evolution of the global trading regime. Hopefully, this is a timely discussion within the global trade protectionism on the rise.

LL.B. (Zhongshan University), LL.M. (Peking University), M.A. and Ph.D. (University of British Columbia). Associate Professor at the School of Law, City University of Hong Kong. Research interests cover intellectual property, international trade, trade and investment in the PRC, and legal theory. Arbitrator, South China International Economic and Trade Arbitration Commission; Central IRB Member, Hong Kong Hospital Authority Central Institutional Review Board. Recent publications include monographs The Origin of Copyright: Expression as Knowing in Being and Copyright Onto-Epistemology (London: Routledge, 2021), and WTO Jurisprudence: Governments, Private Rights, and International Trade (London: Routledge, 2020), and other peer-reviewed articles in various journals such as World Trade Review, Asian Journal of Comparative Law, Leiden Journal of International Law, Journal of International Economic Law, Journal of World Trade, Journal of East Asia and International Law, and Hong Kong Law Journal.
